The Community:

- * Fond du Lac, WI, population 42,203, is located at the southern tip of Lake Winnebago, approximately 65 miles north of Milwaukee. Primarily a manufacturing community, the major employers produce marine engines, machine tools, auto ignition parts, cardboard products and many metals related products. The local hospital is also a major employer and community resource. The community has three post-secondary schools: Marian University, University of Wisconsin - Fond du Lac and the Moraine Park Technical College.

The School District:

- * The Fond du Lac School District is the 17th largest in the state. The district consists of 9 elementary schools, 3 middle schools and Fond du Lac High School. Two community parochial high schools enroll approximately 200 students each. Fond du Lac High School is the 2nd largest in the state and has a curriculum designed to meet the needs of a student body of 2,400 in grades 9 - 12. It is accredited by the North Central Association of Secondary Schools and the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction

Student Profile:

- * Each year approximately 55% of graduates go on to 4 year colleges/universities, 17% to technical colleges, 3% to the military and 10% to full-time employment. Approximately 60% of each graduating class takes the ACT exam with the average composite scores as follows:

Grading:

- * Students receive quarter grades every 9 weeks and final grades at the end of a semester. Semester final grades are permanently recorded on the transcript. Letter grades "A", "B", "C" and "D" represent passing marks. A grade of "F" represents a failing mark. A grade of "E" indicates that the student was medically excused from the course. A grade of "P" indicates a passing mark. A=90-100 B=80-89 C=70-79 D=60-69 F=Below 60.

Grade Point Average:

- * GPA is computed on a standard 4.0 scale. Prior to 2001 Physical Education is not included in the GPA.

Rank in Class:

For each semester class, students earn rank points which accumulate and determine their rank in class. Rank points earned in a subject are determined by multiplying a factor (3 for regular classes, 4 for weighted classes) times the numerical grade point value (4,3,2,1,0). Student rank in class is based on total accumulated rank points - the student earning the greatest number of rank points will be ranked number one in the class with the total for each student determining his/her position. Weighted classes are: Algebra II, Pre-Calculus, AP Calculus, AP Statistics, AP Biology, Accelerated Physics, AP Physics, Accelerated Chemistry, AP Chemistry, World Language, levels 3, 4 and 5, AP English 12, AP Politics & Government, AP U.S. History, AP Psychology. Each is identified with a * on the transcript.
